After months of anticipation, Grange Co-op successfully closed on a property for its new state-of-the-art Distribution Center, Located

adjacent to the South Medford retail store, this expansive facility is over twice the size of the previous Purchasing and Distribution Center. It features modern safety provisions and upgraded facilities that go well beyond the need for additional space.

CEO Neil Itzen shared his excitement, envisioning "more opportunity for growth" as the larger center begins to fill. Already, the warehouse is bustling with pallets of Rogue Feed, and the farm and ranch products customers have come to rely on.

Spanning over six acres and offering 71,000 square feet of warehouse space, this new Distribution Center marks a significant milestone for Grange Co-op. It represents not just a step forward in capacity but a commitment to serving customers with even greater efficiency and abundance as the organization looks to the future.

area will be a highlight for pet owners in the community.

combination of state grants, district funds, and community donations. As part of those contributions, Grange Co-op provided over 100 gates and panels to facilitate the safe handling and penning of livestock, including many of the student's project animals. Besides the large arena, the building also includes new offices, storage, and two new classrooms.

Our Annual Paint-A-Pumpkin event brought creativity and community spirit to all seven store locations. Held on a lovely Saturday in October, the event provided pumpkins, paints, and brushes, as we invited participants of all ages to craft their own mini masterpieces.
